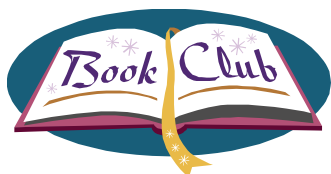

However, there is an important change this year. **We will be taking appointments for tax assistance only in the library, not by telephone.** The AARP program has forms that must be filled out by individuals **before** they come to their appointment. The volunteers will be here from 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday evenings and from 12:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Saturday afternoons. We have information on other locations offering tax help, tax forms (look for the large Uncle Sam) and books such as *J. K. Lasser's Your Income Tax* available as well.

March Computer Classes

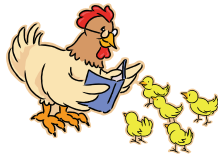

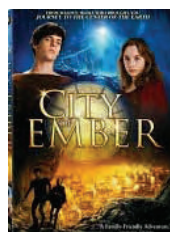
