July Speaker

Scott Peterson, Senior Corporal
Euless Police Department

“Our vision of the **Commercial Vehicle Enforcement** program started back in February of 2009 when we had a mother of 3 killed by an 18 wheeler that slammed into the car she was driving and then landing on top of it. Due to the condition of the 18 wheeler, it should have never been on the road that day. We found 8 of its 10 brakes faulty and over 15 other safety violations. Our research and recent federal law changes guided us to a program that qualified us to enforce Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations (FMCSR). The FMCSR are more stringent laws that hold the truck driver and trucking company to a higher standard of safety. After 6 months of schools and training, Senior Officer Ramon Fratelli, Senior Officer Robert Provost and myself (Senior Corporal Scott Peterson) have become certified to enforce these laws in the hopes of gaining safety compliance from the many trucks that operate in our area. I will discuss this program with you, its benefits to the community, and show you the equipment we utilize to perform our duties as CVE officers.”








Spotlight on Byron Benoit


What can I say about Byron Benoit? I'll start with the basics. He was born in Thibodaux, Louisiana, way back in 1966—September 22 to be exact. Byron was a member of the first CPA class where he said he enjoyed learning about the history of law enforcement. He recently returned from an Ironman Triathlon in Idaho. Now I asked myself, what exactly is an Ironman Triathlon? It is one of a series of long-distance triathlon races organized by the World Triathlon Corporation. It consists of a 2.4-mile swim, a 112-mile bike ride and a marathon run of 26 miles 385 yards, raced in that order and without a break. Most Ironman events have a strict time limit of 17 hours with cut-off times for each of the various events within.

Now Byron's goal was to compete in an Ironman Triathlon by the time he was 40 and to compete in three altogether. At 39, his lovely wife reminded him that he didn't know how to swim. So he picked up "how to swim" books, got tips from others and learned.

As a result, he was able to compete in three Ironman competitions—Arizona 2007, Florida 2008 and Coeur d'Alene 2010. Besides Leah, another big supporter of his dream is our own Barney Snitz whom he described as a surrogate Dad, a man he dearly loves. Having met his goal of participating in three Ironman Triathlons, Byron plans to return to his first love, which is running.

As for other enjoyable activities, Byron likes to read non-fiction books. His two favorites are "Same Kind of Different as Me" by Ron Hall and Denver Moore and "Lone Survivor: The Eyewitness Account of Operation Redwing and the Lost Heroes of SEAL Team 10" by Marcus Luttrell and Patrick Robinson. The first book has a local Texas setting and is about a homeless man and a rich man. Byron said he had a hard time putting this one down. The second book is a Navy SEAL's account of his mission in Afghanistan. Both books sound very thought provoking.

Other forms of relaxation include surfing the internet and keeping up with friends on Facebook. He also likes to eat. His favorite—snow cones in the summer. Because of his work and training schedule, we don't always see him at Alumni Association functions; however, when food is involved, we just might see him. I've actually seen him eat food that would require extra running time to burn off calories, but, we all indulge from time to time. In summary, Byron is a very interesting young man. Year started and history with the EPD: I started my law enforcement career in January of 1991 with the Richland Hills Police Department where I worked patrol. Our Civilian Police Academy Alumni Association Member has done it again!

Byron Benoit completed the Idaho Ironman in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho on June 27, 2010. He has done Ironman Florida, Ironman Arizona, and now Ironman Idaho.

What is an Ironman Competition?

An athlete needs to meet the challenge of a 2.4 mile swim, followed by a 112 mile bike race, and then a full distance marathon, 26.2 miles.

The 2.4 mile swim is an open water event. The water temperature was around 61 degrees. The swim is a 2-loop rectangle running counter-clockwise from the west side of the resort in Coeur d'Alene Lake. Athletes exit the water and run around a marker on the beach before reentering the lake for the second loop. It was a mass start. Which means Byron swam with over 2,000 kicking, pushing, shoving and thrashing swimmers. Byron did the swim in 1 hour and 31 minutes averaging 2:24'/100m. Once the swim is completed, you come out of the water and enter a transition area. Out of your wet suit and on with the biking gear.



The biking event is a race not a bike rally. A bike rally is where you can stop every ten miles, eat, rest, and use the bathroom. A bike race is not only trying to beat other cyclists but is a race against the clock. Each event has a time limit and if you do not make the cut off, you are out of the race. While on the bike, you have to eat for energy, drink for hydration, and use the bathroom. The Ironman Idaho bike route is a two loop course with plenty of rolling hills which is not only physically challenging but mentally. It is hard to go by the same area once let alone two times. Byron did the bike portion in 6 hours and 40 minutes averaging 16:8 mph. After cycling 112 miles you come into the second transition area. Out of your cycling gear and into your running gear. Now you have been biking 112 miles for almost 7 hours!

Then off you go running a full distance marathon, 26.2 miles! The weather was in the mid 70's. Runners ran parallel to the shore of Lake Coeur d'Alene for two loops, with one defining steep climb at the southern turn-around point. Byron completed the run in 4 hours and 19 minutes averaging 9:54/mile. You have to be one tough Ironman to keep on keeping on! Can you imagine running 26.2 miles after biking 112 miles and swimming 2.4 miles!!!!

After racing 140 plus miles over a period of 12 hours and 42 minutes, Byron finished overall 913 out of 2,262 participants.
