

October Meeting Features Investigator from Tarrant County DA's Office

Did you know that people were stealing from you last night, even as you slept? What happens to young offenders when they commit their first offense? You can find the answers to these and other questions you might have about the responsibilities of the Tarrant County District Attorney's Criminal Investigation Division at the ECPAAA meeting on October 20th at 7:00 PM in the large conference room in Building A.

Our speaker for the October meeting will explain "paper crimes" and how they affect our lives and the First Offender program. He is Kevin McIntire from the Criminal District Attorney's Office of Tarrant County. He will discuss forgery, fraud, and the costly crime of writing hot checks. Mr. McIntire is also in charge of the Deferred Prosecution Program which is a first offenders program for persons between the ages of 17 and 21.



Kevin was born and raised in west Fort Worth and is currently working on a degree in Psychology at TCJC. He has been working for Tarrant County for eleven and a half years, beginning his career as a jailer in Tarrant County. From there he worked three and a half years in the patrol division of the Sheriff's Dept. and then worked four years undercover in a multi-agency task force. Kevin was hired in 1995 by the District Attorney's office as an investigator, where he presently serves. To keep his sanity, Kevin enjoys hunting, fishing, and coaching Little League baseball for boys and girls. He is actively involved in his church and is a player/coach of his church's co-ed softball team.


Just so that you will know, the City of Arlington, our suburb to the south, only had 62 NNO observances.

Tips for Keeping New Members

The following article is copied from the Citizen's Police Academy of North Texas Regional Newsletter.

Keeping New Members

Recruiting new members to the group is only half the battle. The other half is keeping them involved in your organization. For every member who is active in the association, there are probably two who would be involved if they were properly motivated or enticed. The following are ideas to keep in mind as you recruit new members.

Keeping New Members Involved and Productive

1. Help new members find a place in the association. Not everyone is a self-starter. Many will offer to help but have no idea where to begin. Develop a list of volunteer activities that includes a job description and approximate time commitment for each task. This will be a great start for your new members.

2. Always welcome new people and attempt to make them feel at ease with the group. Officers and board members should watch for new faces at each meeting and welcome them enthusiastically. Each new or potential member should be introduced to someone who lives near them or shares a similar interest. Designate an official "greeter" at every meeting.

3. Avoid the appearances of cliques. New members who see the same people running every project will feel excluded and may not return. Appoint people who are not part of the core group to position of leadership. Sensitivity to this issue is central to creating a sense of belonging among group members.

4. Encourage new ideas and input in all levels of the organization. This is often most difficult for people who long have been involved in the association and are more knowledgeable on the area than newcomers. People coming into a situation for the first time, however, are able to see things in a new light and can offer new solutions to old problems. They just might have the answer that you have been seeking. New perspectives can assist the whole group in problem solving.

5. Every meeting should exemplify the strongest commitment to organization. Busy people will not attend meetings or involve themselves in organizations they consider to be a waste of time. Organization will also endow the association with a sense of accomplishment from the outset. Create a written agenda before each meeting and stick to it.

6. Maintain current membership records. Keep a file that lists members' names, addresses, phone numbers, family member names, occupations, talents, concerns, areas of interest, etc.

7. Enjoy yourself and have fun. The work of the alumni association should not be boring drudgery. Sponsor parties and celebrations to get to know your members better. Have events that appeal to all, including children. This will foster a strong sense of community spirit.

Chief McKamie Shares Crime Statistics and the Credit

Administrative assistant Kim Ross has been doing some statistical comparisons for us and I thought you might find some of it quite interesting. She compared crime for the five (5) year period of 1993 through 1997. The results are as follows:

CATEGORY	1993	1997	%CHANGE
TOTAL CRIME	5844	5114	-12.49%
MAJOR CRIME	2504	1798	-28.19%
BURGLARIES	383	294	-23.24%
AUTO THEFT	153	118	-22.88%
ARRESTS	3740	4678	+25.08%
CRIME WATCHES	17	100	+488.24%

As a city, we have a lot to be proud of. These figures we show you rank at or near the top of that list of things of which we can be proud. Those are significant decreases in crime and a great deal of the credit goes to the people involved in increasing our crime watch program by 488 %. Mike brown lead the effort and did a wonderful job but he didn't do it alone. It took the efforts of key people in our

community. The ECPAAA played a large part in forming key people into a cohesive group who can get things done. In addition, your police officers have done an outstanding job and they also deserve a great deal of credit for this decrease in crime. That's the best part of it for me, we did it together. That's how it's supposed to work.

A special thanks to those of you who played a part in making the 911 day special for our dispatchers. You went far above the call of duty. Our dispatchers are special people doing the hardest job in the city and you made them feel extra special that night. Thanks!!
